

Sun Shines on Outdoor Show

After two days of much needed but heavy rainfall, the day of the Library Quilter's 3rd Biannual Outdoor Quilt Show on September 21 was picture perfect with sunny skies and cool breezes. Library visitors were treated to a panorama of colorful quilts, wall hangings, pillow covers, and baby quilts displayed against the background of the library's Nature Trail where tours were being conducted to view the new additions to the trail of trees, shrubs and wildflowers.

The library property consist of over 300 trees. Throughout the years, since the present library first opened its doors in 1993, area residents have donated trees and shrubs to enhance the library grounds. Recently more flora was added from donors and through a grant from NiSource. After the Nature Trail tour, library staff held an tea served with homemade desserts to show the library's appreciation to all the donors.

Stan Sims of Purdue Cooperative Extension Service conducted the Nature Trail Tours and met with the donors. In his presentation he told them of the wonderful educational tool the Trail and grounds had become thanks in part to their efforts. He also noted the foresight of the library board to have chosen a site for the library that encompassed the beautiful wooded acres that community residents could enjoy for generations to come. The Friends of the Library were also on hand at the event hosting a plant sale and offering Nature Trail T-shirts as a fundraiser. The beautiful day ended too soon but was a glorious way to say goodbye to summer and look forward to the fall colors that will soon grace the library setting.


Library Highlights

Battle of the Bulge: A Soldier's Story - Lowell

Bill Tuley survived what is said to be the worst battle of World War II, the Battle of the Bulge. He will share his memories of staving off the German offensive in the Ardennes Forest. The battle lasted from December 16, 1944, to January 28, 1945. The battle was waged in one of the most terrible winters on record with American and British soldiers facing German tanks and rocket fire. There were 81,000 American casualties with 19,000 killed.

All summer long members of the Kids' Nature Club went "buggy" over insects! They covered the library grounds looking for beetles, praying mantises, caterpillars, locusts, grasshoppers, earwigs, and other creepy, crawly, dive bombing creatures.

At the club's monthly meetings the members could see their bugs magnified through the library's colorful Creature Peeper containers. Some members brought in bugs to keep on the Reference Desk for a day before the little creatures were given a new home on the library's Nature Trail. Reference Librarian Darlene Rigg brought monarch and eastern black swallowtail caterpillars and milkweed and parsley for their food. Dozens of beautiful butterflies emerged by the end of the summer to be set free on the library grounds.

Stan Sims, Lake County Extension Service Educator, brought insects from Purdue University to teach club members about insect life and behavior.

A party was held at the September meeting before the club resumes in the Spring of 2003. Club members brought desserts shaped in the form of bugs and entered a drawing for prizes. Each member who attended received a "Herbie: A of Bugstown Story" coloring book, and Insect Hunter ribbons. Members are looking forward to next summer vacation and fun at the Kids' Nature Club."
