Happy New Year!

In this new year, in a new century with its rapidly changing world, we can all hope that peace and tranquility will prevail and that life will improve for all.

For the Lowell Public Library and its Shelby and Schneider branches, the new year is also the year of the birthday of Lowell. The library will join in the celebration of Lowell's 150th birthday by displaying exhibits throughout the year that reflect the town's history. In the spring, new flower beds will be planted along Commercial Avenue in honor of the Lowell Sesquicentennial.

Reflecting on the accomplishments of 2001, the library was pleased to have been awarded three grants to enhance the library's grounds, service to its patrons and additions to its collection. In March, the library was a recipient of a Humanities grant which helped enrich the library's collection of American history and literature. The grant provided 50 Library of America volumes published between 1992 and 2000. In the spring of 2001 the library was awarded a grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The grant provided for four Gates computers and the network equipment needed for the computers' connections. Two Gates computers were placed in the Schnieder Branch, one in the Shelby Branch and one at the library. Five additional Gates computers were then purchased for the library. Each Gates computers contains several programs for adults and children.

As the only library in Lake County to have a nature trail, the library was excited to be a recipient of a NiSource Environmental Challenge Grant for the planting of several trees, shrubs and wildflowers for its Nature Trail Project. The successful monthly Gardening series co-sponsored by the Purdue Cooperative Extension Program has spawned a Junior Master Gardener's Program at the library to begin this spring. Program numbers for adults and children soared during 2001.

In all, it was a year filled with progress for the library and its branches; and the library looks forward to a bright 2002.

Schneider and Shelby Branches Look Ahead

The Schneider Branch Library enjoys its home in the Schneider Community Building. With its lease recently renewed for three more years, the branch library looks forward to offering even better service to its patrons in 2002.

Mrs. Beier became branch head when the branch library first opened its doors in 1986. Since that time she has seen the expansion of the library, the addition of videos, books on CD to the branches, and the ability to provide Internet Access to branch patrons. Mrs. Beier is looking forward to many more years serving the people of her community and is anxious to begin training on Dynix (the library's online catalog). Once in operation, it will allow library patrons to access materials from the main library in Lowell, the Shelby Branch, the Lake County Public Library and its branches. "The Dynix will be a wonderful addition to the library," states Mrs. Beier. "Our library use has already increased with the addition of the Gates computers and all that the programs offer."

Mrs. Eleanor Bartz of the Shelby Branch Library is equally enthused about the Lowell Library's efforts to provide online catalog service to Shelby patrons. "This will be a great asset to students who want to order books for school assignments and to patrons who read several books a week." The branches are expected to go online in the spring.
