True Tales of the Town of Lowell

Read All About It! "Bandits of the John Dillinger Gang Rob the Lowell Bank" (May 1933).

What really happened in the town of Lowell on that Tuesday morning of May 25, 1933? The new Internet Web site "Lowell History" created by Reference Librarian Darlene Rigg is filled with fascinating articles of the early days of Lowell. Access the site at http://birch.palni.edu/~drigg/history.htm and you can read news articles taken from the early pages of the Lowell Tribune and articles written by Town Historian Richard Schmal in his *Pioneer History* articles. The Web page will take you back in time from Lowell's early beginnings to the late 1960's.

What was everyday life in Lowell like? Who were its early settlers and how did Lowell become a town. You can access this information and news articles about Lowell's early businesses, its churches, schools, parks, museums, newspapers, etc. The articles included on the Web site cover a period between 1835 and the late 1960's.

Read the history of the town's fire and police department, its early doctors, its fires, disasters, crimes and criminals. Although the Lowell page on the John Dillinger gang does not state the gang as being the actual bank robbers of the Lowell National Bank, this gang robbed several other Indiana banks around this time. The Three Creek Bicentennial Book, 1776-1976, however, has an exciting story about this same robbery, and credits the Dillinger gang.

Among the early Lowell facts on the Web... According to the Lowell Centennial Book, Melvin A. Halsted named the village Lowell presumably because its water facilities and milling industries resembled those of Lowell, Massachussetts.

The first home in Lowell was a cabin built by Samuel Halstead in 1835. John Driscoll was the first farmer settling on a quarter section of land southeast of Lowell. On February 16, 1837, Lake County became an independent county. and in 1839 the south township of Lake County was devided into the townships of West Creek, Cedar Creek, and Eagle Creek. The town of Lowell was laid out in 1852.

Early pioneer Jabez Clark practiced medicine although there is no record of whether or not he was an actual doctor. In 1837, Dr. James A Wood began making rounds in Lake and Porter County.

The "good old days," saw their share of disasters and fires. On May 22, 1952, a 69-car Monon Railroad express freight derailed in Lowell and six cars of denatured alcohol exploded. In 1974 a tornado hit Lowell, causing over \$1.5 million in damages

Students, genealogy researchers, and area residents will find the "Lowell History" Web site to be a valuable and efficient tool to access information on the town's history. History buffs will also enjoy its colorful articles.




