Consolidation Issue Hot and Heavy in State Senate

The short session of the Indiana State Legislature has begun with the introduction of Senate Bill 348, regarding the library consolidation issue. The bill calls for, among other components, the formation of a planning committee in each Indiana county, charged with selecting 1 of 5 service models for libraries, one being county-wide consolidation.

The Library Board of Trustees and Library Director Sandy Morgan continue their strong opposition to mandatory consolidation of your library into a countywide system. They are re-enforced by the many local residents who have contacted their legislators to also voice opposition and the many petition signatures (over 1,800) of local residents that were presented to county and state elected officials.

The libraries in Lake County serve diverse areas, industrial, urban and rural. "One size does not fit all." Whereas consolidation would not mean the liquidation of the Lowell Public Library, it could ultimately mean the closing of the Shelby and Schneider branches. The local library tax dollars that have been used exclusively for your library may be put in one county pot. As newly acquisitioned libraries come under one board, the effort to fund and maintain the programs and services of the larger libraries may well leave the smaller ones facing shrinking budgets, less materials, shorter hours, and less staff to serve them, even though local taxpayers may find themselves paying a higher rate for "county" library service.

There are no feasibility studies, cost-benefit analyses or flow charts as to any savings with consolidation. Yet, the cost to consolidate all 7 Lake County Library Districts and their 21 branch libraries into one county-wide system, would be enormous as would the management of all these library systems under one county board.

Indiana libraries are among the best in the nation. According to the 2007 statistics Indiana ranks 4th among the states in per capita circulation of library materials. Library visits per capita ranks Indiana 2nd in the nation. In Collection expenditures per capita, Indiana ranks 3rd. Statistics were taken from the 2007 edition of *The Bowker Annual Library and Book Trade Almanac* and from the National Council on Educational Statistics. "More than three-quarters of library users believe libraries spend tax dollars well. Even among non-users, 6 in 10 say they believe libraries use their funds wisely." (source: Americans for Libraries Council).

Director Morgan plans to meet with state legislators on Legislative Day, February 24, to discuss SB 348 and express the importance of the Lake County libraries maintaining local control with emphasis on collaboration and other cooperative agreements to provide cost savings among the library districts.

Connection to the community your library serves, creative programming, quality and efficient service and fiscal responsibility is best achieved under local control.

It is important that you as a library patron and taxpayer keep contacting our legislators, as the next two months may decide the fate of Indiana libraries and elected officials need to hear your voices.

Access us on the web! You will find the Lowell Public Library's web site at <www.lowellpl.lib.in.us>. The site offers links to the Lowell Library's Catalog, (including Lake County Public Library's catalog), and the Lowell Library Lines newsletter including back issues.

The Lowell History site contains local facts and news stories of businesses, churches, crimes and criminals, disasters, doctors, fires, geography, houses, libraries, monuments, museums, newspapers, parks, police, population, the post office, the fire department, schools, etc., and a history time line.

New to the Lowell History site is the Lowell High School Yearbook index, 1915 to 2006. This index to the names in the Lowell (Indiana) High School yearbooks indicates in which yearbook volume, and on which pages, a name can be found as well as how many photos of the person appear on a particular page. All local names appear, whether they are students, school personnel, etc.

Abraham Lincoln Birthday Bash


