House to Determine Libraries' Fate

For several months your library has asked your support in opposition of the State's proposal to consolidate the Lowell Public Library and all other Indiana libraries into county-wide systems. With consolidation, your home library would become a branch of a larger library. All decision making, as to providing services, programs, operating funds, etc., would be determined at the county level instead of by the 7 member, all volunteer library board, that now serves the Tri-Creek community.

Many of our community's residents responded to the threat of consolidation by contacting their elected state officials that represent our district. We want to thank you for this support. Now, more than ever, your letters, phone calls and e-mails are crucial to the fate of our library as Senate Bill #348 goes before the House.

To update you on the consolidation issue, Senate Bill #348— Library Reorganization, was passed through the State Senate with amendments introduced by Senator Sue Landske, at the request of the 7 independent Lake County district libraries: Lowell, Crown Point, Gary, Hammond, East Chicago, Whiting and Lowell. During the 2nd reading of the bill on the Senate floor, a request was made and granted to exclude Marion County from the bill. Shouldn't Lake County libraries be given the same consideration, especially in these tough economic times when people will turn to their libraries for the free resources they offer?

In Lake County alone, the cost of consolidating its 7 district libraries into a county-wide system would be enormous. And, a proposed county planning committee, that is included in the bill, would cost hundreds of thousands dollars more. This is the experience other libraries across the state would also face. The bill, passed by the Senate, now goes to the House for consideration. While 6.5% of Indiana's population (spread over 38 counties) is without library service or is underserved, there are 54 counties in Indiana (Lake County being one of them) that provide library service to all its citizens. SB 348 should focus on those 38 counties while allowing streamlined options for the majority of the counties that provide full library service.

Lowell and its sister libraries in Lake County not only meet, but exceed, the current library standards. With a long standing record of fiscal responsibility, the Lowell Library is committed to adhering to Indiana State Library standards and can demonstrate financial viability while establishing long range and technology plans. The types of programs and services the library offers the Tri-Creek area, composed of over 19,000 residents, are more often found with larger urban libraries. Only with independence can your library be most responsive to your library needs.

DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME BEGINS SUNDAY, MARCH 8, 2009

Daylight Saving Time (or summertime as it is called in many countries) is a way of getting more light out of the day by advancing clocks by one hour during the summer. During Daylight Saving Time, the sun appears to rise one hour later in the morning, when people are usually asleep anyway, and sets one hour later in the evening, seeming to stretch the day longer. The reason DST works is because it saves energy due to less artificial light needed during the evening hours— clocks are set one hour ahead during the spring, and one hour back to standard time in the autumn.
