A Good Year For The Branches



The opening of the Schneider and Shelby Branches was an exhilarating time for library staff members and local residents who had put their time and talents into setting up the branches. They hoped they had created a warm and inviting atmosphere and that the community residents would be pleased with the new libraries.

Now, three years later, the Lowell Public Library finds that since their debut, the Shelby and Schneider Branches have exceeded all expectations and are wlecomed and thriving parts of their community, providing quality library services to their citizens.

Shelby Branch Head, Eleanor Bartz, Mrs. B. as she is fondly known by library users, and Schneider Branch Head, Betty Beier, state that there isn't a spare moment to be had as circulation increases and new patrons continue to register for library cards. Circulation figures for Shelby (population 700) was 5,922 in 1988, 15,227 in 1990. Materials circulated at the Schneider Branch were increased to 6,211 in 1990, up from 5,186 in 1988. Schneider's population is 350 residents.

Visitors to the Shelby Branch Library often tell Mrs. B. how pleased they are with the collection of new hardbound books. They also love the new paperback books, mysteries and romance novels, and the access they have to up-to-date information.

The children crowd into story-hours, toddler times and craft programs, brought to them by Miss Chris, the library's children's programmer. Mrs. B. is very happy that school children have good reference materials to help them with their homework.

A high point for Mrs. B. was when a parent told her, he gave the branch library all the credit for imporving his children's report cards.

Recently the library received new carpeting provided by the St. Theresa Church, in which the branch is housed. A new flag flys proudly outside the building donated by the Lowell V.F.W. There's always something new at the Shelby Branch Library.

Digging into the past can be an exciting hobby, but finding information can be an expensive endeavor.


Jane Alexis has had a great deal of experience finding resources that have helped many families search for their roots while keeping their expenses low.
