NEW LIBRARY REFLECTS COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Since November, when the library first announced its "wish list" for the new library, community support has generated over \$8800 in donations and pledges for the library's furnishing fund. These donors are helping to make the new building a special place for all who enters its doors.


