National Library Week (April 18-24)

Do you have a library card? The world and beyond is yours to explore when you own a library card. Better than a Master or Visa card, your library card has already been pre-paid by you and entitles you to unlimited checkout of books, magazines, books-on-tape and CD, music on CD, large print books and CD-Rom materials.

Over 3000 selections of feature videos or DVD's are available for checkout overnight, non-fiction ones for seven nights. Use our public access computers to surf the Internet or to use Microsoft Office including Word for Windows, PowerPoint, Excel, Access. Children can play fun games on the computers too! Enjoy our quiet study rooms for research or study. The reference area also has a group study room and a typing room. Rooms with computers can be used for word processing and other computer functions. Last year the library offered over 550 senior, adult, young adult and children's programs and special events at the library and its branches.

Children who can print their first and last names can get their own library cards. This is a wonderful way for parents to help instill the love of life-long reading and help prepare their children for their education.

Appreciation for Library Workers

Library staff take great pleasure in serving their patrons. Recognizing the efforts of all library workers, including librarians and support staff who make library service possible each working day, the Allied Professional Association of the American Library Association (ALA-APA) is sponsoring the 1st ever National Library Workers Day on Tuesday, April 20, during National Library Week.


Save a Life Donate Blood

MEET THE

"FUR TRADE ERA"

Something different is coming our way. It's colorful, interesting and fun! Adults and children are invited to visit, play, and learn about the French-Canadian voyageurs that canoed through the Grand Kankakee centuries ago bringing textiles and metal goods to the merchants, who in turn traded those goods for furs with the Native Americans. What is now the town of Lowell was part of that area.



On Saturday, May 8, from 12 noon to 4 PM reenactors will portray the different travelers and inhabitants of the Kankakee from 1690's through the 1780's. Enjoy demonstrations of skilled crafts. See and touch the "trade goods" on display, beads, trade silver, furs, cloth and a trade journal used to keep account records. Share the historical tales that have come from this exciting era. Clothing from the time period is colorful, fanciful and functional. To fully appreciate the clothing, one must remember that everything must was hand made. Reenactors coming in traditional clothing make their own clothes and are very proud of them. Children and adults can try their skills at several games and toys from the period. In, addition, children will have an opportunity to color pictures and make a craft to take home.
