Tuesday, April 4, at 7 PM. Peggy Archer, author of *One of the Family*, a Little Golden Book and *Turkey Surprise*, published by Dial Books for Young Readers, wants to help other authors learn the ins and outs of writing and getting their books published. Archer, who writes poetry, fiction and non-fiction has also written *From Dawn to Dreams*, a book of poems for babies, soon to be published by Candlewick Press. Archer's work has also appeared in *BabyBug*, *LadyBug*, *Highlights*, *Humpty Dumpty*, *Turtle* and other children's magazines. She is an active member of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators in Indiana and Illinois.

New @ your library

Look for the new fiction and non-fiction books for adult, young adult and child readers, books-on-tape and CD, large print books, music cassettes and CDs. There are always new materials at the library. New magazines include *Backyard Living*, *Wild West* and *Simple & Delicious*.

The Way of the Ship by Derek Dundy and The Wolf's Head:Writing Lake Superior by Peter Unwin, Marley and Me by John Grogan and The Zaher by Paulo Coelho are some of several new non-fiction books available in the New Book Section of the library. New fiction books by popular authors are on display and ready for checkout in this section.

Children and young adults will have plenty of new books to read for Summer Reading Club and the Young Adult Reading Contest starting in June. Toddlers and pre-school children love the library's board books because the books are sturdy and easy for small hands to grasp. Little ones can head for the big bin in the Children's Room where they have easy access to dozens of new board books to choose from. These books are a wonderful way to foster a love of reading by sharing stories with their children. Children are always asking for books at the circulation desk. From *Dora the Explorer* to *Bob the Builder* books, to books for older children like the new arrivals, *Circle of Doom* by Tim Kennenore, *Mallory on the Move* by Laurie Friedman and *South By Southwest* by Anthon Horowitz children can always spot new books on the shelves. One of the latest sets of non-fiction childrens' books is the *Getting to Know the Presidents* series.

In the Children's Room young children can also play games or use headphones to listen to interactive stories on the computer. Among the computer programs are Arthur's Math, Arthur's Carnival, The Cat in the Hat, Green Eggs and Ham, Paul Bunyan, Flight, Mars and Whales.



For Researchers and Genealogy Seekers

Just a reminder! At the library patrons can use any of the 10 public Internet access computers. Please bring your library card or picture ID. On the computers patrons have on-line access to the newly added database *Reference USA*. With this database patrons have the ability to search for telephone numbers and addresses of residential and business names. Search over 10.5 businesses by company name, type of business, geography, business size and more. *Electric Library* provides full text access to hundreds of magazines, journals, reference and historical sources, newspapers and children's publications. At the library, or Internet access at home or at businesses Indiana residents can access *Inspire* on the Internet for magazines, encyclopedias, and other resources. The database allows you to research current events, science, business, health, biographies and much more from your library, school, home or office.

In the reference section of the library patrons have access to vital statistics on computer taken from the *Lowell Tribune*: births, engagements, marriages and deaths. Family trees from select families who have donated information are available as well as microfilm from local newspapers dating back to 1886. Lake County census records are available on microfilm from 1850 to 1920.



During National Library Week we would like to thank the people who help make the library the best it can be through their volunteerism.

The Lowell Public Library Board of Trustees is responsible for making policies for the operation of the Library, for obtaining adequate funding for Library materials and services and for promoting the Library in the community. Library Board members (7) are appointed and volunteer their time and talents to serve the Tri-Creek community through their service as board members.

The Friends of the Library is an Organization that raises funds to provide monies for programs and materials that are not included in the library budget. Recently the Friends announced that from 1999 to the present the organization has donated over \$35,000 to the library for programming and the Endowment Fund. Through their fundraising Friends provide monies for program speakers, fund Summer Reading Club and the Young Adult Reading Contest, and other children's programs and special events at the library. An upcoming event is the Student's Art Exhibit held for one week in May for students of Tri-Creek area elementary schools to display their artwork in the Children's Room. Friends hold a reception during the week to recognize the efforts of the young artists and invite their families for refreshments.

To raise funds Friends provide an on-going book sale in the main room of the library on the southwest wall. You can help the Friends help the library by recycling your books, CDs and movies by donating them to the library. As a fundraiser Friends also provide the public with copier use. Other fundraisers include T-shirt and coloring book sales. The popular comfort bus trip the Friends Group offer each year to the Chicago Flower and Garden Show at Navy Pier is always a sell-out.

Become a member of the Friend. The dues are \$5 a year and with membership you receive a copy of the library newsletter mailed to your home. The Friends meet the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 7 PM.

MEET THE

"FUR TRADE ERA"

Did you know that Lowell was part of the area where French-Canadian voyageurs traded textiles and metal goods with merchants, who, in turn, traded with the Native Americans for furs? The voyageurs canoed through the Grand Kankakee centuries ago. Adults and children are invited to visit, play with and learn about the French-Canadian voyageurs on Saturday, April 22, from 12 noon to 4 PM.

Re-enactors will portray the different travelers and inhabitants of the Kankakee from the 1690's through the 1780's. Enjoy demonstrations of skilled crafts. See and touch the "trade goods" on display, beads, trade silver, furs, cloth and a trade journal used to keep account records. Share the historical tales that have come from this exciting era. Clothing from the time period is colorful, fanciful and functional. To fully appreciate the clothing, one must remember that everything was hand made. Re-enactors coming in traditional clothing make their own clothes and are very proud of them.

Children and adults can try their skills at several games and toys from the period. In addition, children will have an opportunity to color pictures and make a craft to take home. "Meet the Fur Trade Era" program is co-sponsored by the Lake County Parks Department and the library.
