Indiana Libraries: What Happens Next?

Indiana's Senate Bill 348 outlined a process where Indiana libraries would be consolidated into county-wide systems or mandated to form a library service planning committee in each county. Libraries who wished to opt out of the planning committee could have the question placed on the ballot by petition, allowing registered voters within a specific library district or a specific un-served area to determine the inclusion or exemption of their area from their community's local library service plan. However, all of the options in the bill are extremely costly for libraries to undertake with little or no proven benefit to the library districts who have no un-served or underserved areas.

Library directors have a tradition of working together to best meet the needs of their communities and with the new economic downturn it is expected that these efforts will be intensified. With local control your library is an autonomous, community oriented entity run by local volunteer Trustees with the best interest of the residents the library serves. Under local control, taxes collected for library support are only used for your library. Your library already shares services with other libraries to control costs.

SB 348, after undergoing changes and additional amendments, was passed by the State Senate, From there it made its way to the House Government and Regulatory Reform Committee. This bill then failed to exit out of the committee. As of March 11, Indiana libraries will continue to remain under local control.

However, your library and other libraries across the state opposed to SB 348 know that the threat exist that in the final days before the end of the short session of the legislature (April 29) portions of the initial library bill could still be integrated into another bill - and passed. That is why your library along with the other six libraries in Lake County remain vigilant and continue to speak out in support of "local control." And, we encourage our library supporters to do the same by continuing to contact state legislators that represent our district, requesting that they support local control in the legislature on this issue. Calumet Beginnings Explored

During National Library Week (April 12 – 19) explore the history of the Calumet Region with Dr. Kenneth J Schoon, author of *Calumet Beginnings*: *Ancient Shorelines and Settlements at the South End of Lake Michigan*. *Co*-sponsored by the Three Creeks Historical Association and the Lowell Public Library, the program will be held on Tuesday, April 14, at 7 PM. Geographically, the Calumet Region encompasses an area of Illinois and Indiana that lies at the Southern end of Lake Michigan. Towns like Calumet City, Dolton and Burnham, well known neighborhoods as Pullman, Roseland, South Chicago, are part of the Calumet Region as well as areas from Gary and Hammond, to Crown Point and Lowell, Burns Harbor and the Indiana Dunes.

Schoon's stories are filled with details of the French exploration, fur trade, the last trading posts, pioneers and the stagecoach run between Valparaiso and LaPorte, and Fort Dearborn. Railroad buffs will enjoy the description and photographs of the beginning of the railroads in the Calumet Region. The start of the steel industry is another fascinating part of the Region's history. Wetlands and sanctuaries are included in some of the 161 historic photographs in Schoon's book, some of which have never been published.

Schoon is a professor of science education at Indiana University Northwest. Since January of 1999 he has served the School of Education as Associate Dean. In his book, Schoon, who has a bachelor degree in geology, combines his love of science with his passion for history. Join us for a look back at *Calumet Beginnings*.
