AUTOMATION AT LAST (ALMOST)

For those of you who have been carrying around those little plastic cards with zebra stripes on the back for several years, there's good news! The library boards of Lowell and Lake County have signed an agreement for joint use of Lake County's computer system.

In the next four weeks, Lowell will be installing terminals and other related equipment. Staff will be receiving training and getting ready to serve you better. Then one day when you come up to the desk to check out your books, we'll simply take those books and your library card and pass them under a laser light. No more writing down long numbers.

At first, we will only check out books on the computer; other types of materials will still be checked out by hand for the time being.

This new method will save time for our patrons and staff. There may be a few glithes at first as we learn the procedures, and we hope you'll be patient with us!



LIBRARY BOARD LOOKS AHEAD

At their April 12 meeting, the Lowell Library Board gave their approval to employ a library building consultint.

The consultant will study the present services and facilities of the library and project space needs through the year 2000. The consultant will then examine various alternatives for meeting those needs, presenting a written report to the library board.

It is expected that the study which is an out growth of the library's long-range plan will begin this summer and take several months to complete.

Donations may be made to the Lowell Public Library and designated for the Memorial Fund.





STUDENTS AND RESEARCHERS!

C D Rom (Sompact Disc Read-Only Memory) has come to the Lowell Public Library and will soon be available for patron use.

This valuable tool looks like a compact disc used for music but stores print information.

An entire set of a 21 volume encyclopedia, about 9 million words, can be put on a single compact disc.

Our C D Rom discs include: Academic Encyclopedia, Facts on File News Digest, Reader's Guide Abstract Index to magazines, and Micro Soft Bookshelf, which includes American Heritage Dictionary, World Almanac 1987, Bartlett's Familiar Quotations, Chicago Manual of Style, Business Information Sources, and Roget's II: The New Thesaurus.

After staff has become acquainted with the workings of the C D Rom it will be made accessible to the public.

Circulation continues to climb at all three of our libraries.

In March, for the first time, the Shelby branch loaned over 1000 items. Last April, the first month they were open, their circulation was 205. Quite an increase in one year! That's with a collection of 1,433 books, records, etc.

The Schneider branch now has 43 new patrons compared to 7 one year ago.
