She stated that 60% of all learning depends on a child's self-concept, 30% on how motivated a child is and 10% on I.Q. All these components of learning are in the art experience.

Art produces good feelings in a child, builds self confidence, motivates, acts as a release for fear, anger and frustration or provides a way they can express their feelings of happiness and well-being.

Exhibiting their work provides a thrilling experience for them and

inspires them to achieve more.

The Lowell Public Library looks forward to showcasing the talents of the young people who are exhibiting their work and invites the public to visit the library and view the unique creativity of these young artists.

A reception will be held for the exhibitors and their families on Wednesday, May 22nd at 7:00 PM in the library community room. Refreshments will be served.



## The Pleasure of Oil Painting



At the Lowell Public Library several professionals volunteered to talk to the community's youth about their exciting careers. Held in the library's main room, so many children attended it was difficult to find room to seat them and they came prepared, bombarding Helicopter Pilot Carl Nethery, Radio Station Manager Diane Grambo, News Correspondent Melanie Csepiga, Veterinarian Larry Leininger, Artist Diane Carnahan, Child Counselor Diana McIntire, Detective Dennis Heaps, and Surveyor Bill Stefek with question after question. Total attendance for the week was 390 children. The Branch Libraries were all fired up for National Library Week.

At the Schneider Branch Library, firefighters, Wayne Block and Jim Crocker and their wives gave 40 Schneider youngsters a first hand look at life in a fire station. The youngsters put on the firefighters clothes. Some of the firemen's boots reached up to the children's waist. They turned on the power to the water hose and blew the fire whistle. After a walk thru the emergency truck, the firemen talked to them about firefighting and prevention before treating them to balloons, coloring books and refreshments. Things were hopping over at the Shelby Branch Library too. Fifty-two youngsters met at the branch and followed Branch Head, Eleanor Bartz to the Shelby Fire Department, ad-

ministered by Fire Chief Ron

Lambert.

Training Captain Roy Gott-schalk and assistant Alan Corning with help from firefighters Joe Scheive, John Swisher, Rick Clinton, Bonnie Clinton, and Kathy Lawson schooled the children in the workings of a fire department, what differen steps occur when an alarm is sounded before the fire engines leave the building, the different equipment used to fight fires and how the firemen protect themselves and each other while fighting a fire. They also put great' emphasis on teaching youngsters how to get out of their houses should a fire occur. The Lowell Public Library is grateful to the many volunteers who gave of their time and talents to make National Library Week at the Lowell Public Library and its branches a success and to the children who participated. It was a great week!
