"To Know something about treesabout even one tree. is to know something important, something fundamental, something profound about the nature of the world and our place in it." ... From The Living Earth Book of North America.

The tall oaks and maples that surround the new library site are magnificent to behold. Dominating their territory, they nevertheless have embraced new trees recently planted as part of a Small Business Association \$20,000 matching grant through the Indiana Department of Natural Resources.

The new trees are rich in diversity, texture, and seasonal color. Thirty four varieties of trees are represented, including four species of Maples, four Oaks and three Ash that will create a glorious canopy of shade over the drives and walks of the library grounds. Other species of trees are Ohio Buckeye, Pagoda, Dogwood, Carolina Silverbell, Black Gum, Hop Hornbean, Tulip Tree, River Birch, and Apple Serviceberry. Austrian and White Pine will color the winter's landscape.

The trees are a major part of the Library Arbors Project, begun by the library in 1993. The goal of the project is to preserve and replenish the trees for the good of the environment while providing the woods as a natural learning setting for library visitors. A site plan and brochure are currently being prepared to help visitors learn about the trees.

#### WELCOME NEWS!

The library is pleased to announce that once again it is the recipient of a Library Services and Construction Act Title VI grant.

The grant (\$34,692) will allow the program to continue to provide a "full spectrum literacy program" helping students achieve their literacy goals in reading and writing, or speaking English, along with improving basic math skills. Computer literacy classes will also be added to the program. This has become an increasingly important need among students hoping to improve their employment opportunities. As many jobs requiring minimal skills disappear, skills such as computer literacy become increasingly important among students hoping to find employment.

Many literacy students and their tutors have found computer learning a wonderful new and rewarding way to learn. Learning disabled adults, who are reported to total nearly 89% of adult learners, find new hope in technology. Computers with synthesized voice capabilities and multi-sensory applications are proven forms for working with learning disabilities.

Today it is reported that nearly half the adult population in the U.S. is unable to function at the lowest levels of literacy. Renewed funding allows the library to continue much needed literacy efforts.

The library's literacy program began in 1987. Throughout the program's seven year existence, nearly three hundred students have been helped.


