

On Behalf of Innocents - Lowell

Presented by author Caress Garten.
There are approximately 5 million victims of dog bites each year in the USA. Garten, author of *On Behalf of Innocents*, is one of them. Her attack in an Indianapolis park by two vicious dogs is vividly described in her book.

After her recovery, Garten, a dog lover herself, set about to see the law in Indiana changed to make owners of vicious dogs responsible for the injuries their dogs cause to humans.

At this program Garten gives a first person account of the workings of the Indiana Statehouse where, with the help of State Senator Sue Landske, the "dangerous dog law" was passed. Senator Landske was first author of the law that was carried to both houses before being signed by then governor, Evan Bayh.

Garten will also brings to light the underground practice of dog fighting in Indiana and her efforts to have a stronger law passed to put an end to the illegal sport.

Night Nature Walk

As darkness descended and tiny creatures began to stir, the beams of flashlights carried by young explorers on a "bug" hunt suddenly invaded the nature trail of the Lowell Public Library, .

On July 15 over 80 participants, members of the Kids' Nature Club and their parents and grandparents, met at the library just before dark to learn about the creatures of the night at the Night Nature Walk. Leading their way was a "top-notch" guide. Stan Sims, County Extension Director, Agriculture & Natural Resources Educator and Community Development Coordinator is not only knowledgeable about the insect world, he can also captivate young minds with his descriptions of the lives of the insects that inhabit the nature trail. When the walk was over the children had learned about the life cycle of mosquitoes, how fireflies communicate and the identification of several insects they had captured on the trail.

The explorers had listened to the sounds of the night creatures and, as Sims told them they had proven that "nature doesn't sleep at night."
