GROUNDBREAKING TAKES PLACE UNDER SUNNY SKIES

The day was beautiful——the weather warm, as the June 5 groundbreaking ceremonies for a new Lowell Public Library for the Tri-Creek area were about to begin.

At the building site, their hard hats firmly in place and hands clasping golden colored shovels that glistened in the sunlight, library board trustees, leasing corporation members and the library director took to the task of digging the first clumps of dirt that would symbolize the start of construction of the new facility.

With a short speech addressing the many years of research that had gone into the planning of the new facility and what a pleasure it was to represent the library and the community at such an exciting time in the building process, Jeanne Guske, President of the Library Board, concluded the ceremonies.

Throughout the proceedings, cameras clicked and video tape recorded the event. The photographs and film will be placed in the historical files of the new library.


Now the bulldozers, graders, trucks with front end loaders, and backhoes are converging on the construction site, where they will put in roadways, lay the foundation and begin to erect the much needed and eagerly awaited new Lowell Public Library.

A committee has been formed to "color the new library." Committee members will choose the color scheme for the exterior of the building; brick, roof and trim, and also the colors that will grace the walls, floors and furnishings for the interior of the new library.


Working with the group will be resident artist Carole Boller, David Frist and Daunn Guthrie of the Rowland Associates, interior design firm of Indianapolis, and David Nice, of Pecsok, Jelliffe, Randall and Nice, architects for the building project.

A large sign has been placed at the entrance to the construction site declaring the site as the future home of the community's new library.

As the work continues, the library will continue to keep the community informed of progress at the site.







YOUNGSTERS "BLAST OFF" INTO READING

If there is any question that reading is important in the lives of children, check out what's happening at the Lowell Public Library and its Shelby and Schneider Branches.

Just three days after the area schools closed for summer vacation youngsters poured into the libraries to registered for "outer space" adventure as members of the "Blast Off With Books" Summer Reading Club Program. Within the first week of the program the number of children registering for the summer reading club program was well over the 600 mark!


At the Lowell Public Library, 525 youngsters to date have registered for the program. On the first day of registration, June 8, youngsters entering the library or its branches were surprised to find a brightly colored galaxy of stars, planets and spaceships suspended over the children's section. Even the furniture had been changed to look like a space headquarters.

Movies were shown at the Lowell Public Library on the third day of registration and will continue to be shown every week, on Wednesdays until the end of the summer program, August 5. Craft programs, a pet show, rocket demonstration and "Book Walk" are just some of the other upcoming activities youngsters will enjoy as reading club members.

Every ten books a club member reads earns him/her an alien creature to place upon the library rocket ship. Less than a week into the program the ship at the Lowell Public Library was already filled with funny little creatures, from the over 550 books the children had completed reading.

Some of the children registered are toddlers whose moms, dads, grandparents and guardians have chosen to read to them. Starting children to develop a love for reading at an early age is the best way to insure that they will become lifelong readers.

Youngsters can register to be a Summer Reading Club member anytime during the program which runs from June 8 to August 5. Members can attend any or all of the many programs, movies and activities that are scheduled at the Lowell Public Library or its branches throughout the two month session.

LITERACY TUTORS RETURN TO THE FARMS

They are the seasoned veterans of the Lowell Public Library Literacy Program for Migrant Workers. Once again they will return to area farms to teach "Survival English" skills to the agricultural workers who have come from Mexico to sow and reap the season's harvest.

They will be joined by the rookies, the new volunteers of the literacy program. Together these dedicated tutors will make life easier for the farm workers, teaching them English language skills that will enable them to cope with daily life during their stay in this country.

Cedar Lake resident Dorothy Tortorici,
Lowell residents Jane Canfield and Lucy Mendoza,
Darlene Roy of Demotte, and Lucy Mendoza, a
Schneider resident, are the returning tutors for
the migrant program. They are joined, by new
tutors: Mary Lou Delong, Angelica Kepes, Joanne
Brewer, and Betty Larsen of Lowell, and mother
and daughter team Gayle and Wendy Whitaker of
Crown Point.

Vicki Wood, Literacy Coordinator for the library, held a workshop for the new tutors in May to teach the tutoring techniques that will be useful when working with the students the farm. The students, (fourteen have enrolled in the program to date and more are expected) will each be given an Oxford Picture Dictionary, and two Spanish-to-English communication booklets.

The tutors visit the farms every Sunday afternoon, setting up picnic tables under shade trees, where they will work with their students for two or three hours each session.

Tutors are also busy collecting clothing and household goods for the workers. Since the workers must travel from Mexico they are unable to bring with them many of the items that are necessary for everyday living. In the clothing area, blue jeans, T-shirts, work boots, and light weight jackets are needed. Donations of sheets, pillowcases, towels, blankets and pots and pans

would be appreciated and, as the season heats up, fans would also be very welcomed by the workers.


