All systems were go for the kids of the "Blast Off With Books" Summer Reading Club Program of the Lowell Public Library and its Shelby and Schneider Branches. Registering in droves for the program, just two days after school let out for summer vacation, the youngsters really got into the spirit of the library's "outer space" theme. For every ten books club members read they could choose a "space alien" to place aboard the library's many rocket ships, created to inspire the young readers.

Read they did, devouring 23,890 books during the two month program. More than two thirds of the members read ten books or more, and in the process showered the rockets with their funny looking aliens that represented the readers' accomplishments.

Reading wasn't the only activity. Children's programmer, Chris Straka, kept the youngsters busy with exciting "space" adventures. The members made space helmets, played Martian bingo, took a "moon walk" and won a free book, participated in weekly drawings for prizes and dressed as their favorite alien for the costume contest. They also got to see a real rocket blast off when Tom Zlamal and Josh Frizzell, two members of the Schneider Busy Juniors 4-H club, demonstrated their homemade rockets.

The library joined forces with the Parks Department to put on a wonderful puppet show for the children. "The Great Pet Show" gave the youngsters a chance to show off their pets, some of them of the unusual variety. Darlene Rigg, Lowell Reference Librarian, brought her daughter's pet snakes to the show. They were so popular they were brought back for a special program on how to raise snakes given by Darlene's children, Kim and Sam.

Speaking of snakes, Dr. Herbert Hardwick, a Hebron veterinarian, brought his pet boa constrictor named Jake to the Shelby Branch for all the club members to meet. Jake is a real supporter of the reading club program, visiting the members each year to promote interest in books about reptiles. Dr. Hardwick also showed the youngsters his sparrow hawks, Egyptian tomb bat, Australian tortoise and an Argentine horned frog.

The last day of the Summer Reading Club Program was devoted to the "Grand Finale" carnival. The children had loads of fun competing in sack races, the bean bag toss, took a walk on the Candy Walk and played Bozo Buckets.

The Summer Reading Club Program is over and school has begun but library staff know they will continue to see their young friends again. After all, THEY'RE SUPER READERS!

First we had a drought and we hoped for some rain to help the gardens and the farmers' crops. Then Mother Nature went into overdrive sending us the second wettest July in our history——not to mention the tornadoes in June. She sure made things tough for the farmers and in the process reeked havoc with the construction schedule for our new library, as day, after day, after day—the rains came. A delay in receiving a steel order has also slowed things down a bit.

The construction crew was able to complete excavation for retaining walls and prepare an area for a bridge to be placed over a culvert that leads to Harrison Avenue, the library's north exit. The rain did have one positive note; the library was able to draw interest on the approximately \$150,000 they would have spent for construction cost for that time period. Grant monies for the project were not affected by the slowdown. With a little luck Mother Nature will take a breather and construction will be able to move forward at a faster pace.

The design committee for the new facility has been hard at work finalizing their selections of color scheme and furniture. Their selections for the exterior of the library are on display near the entrance of the existing library's main room. Landscaping the new library site, enhancing its splendid woods, is one of the next priorities for the library board to undertake. In the interest of safety and security no trespassing signs have been posted throughout the parameters of the building site, and only authorized personnel are permitted entrance.

A new library is on its way--- bit by bit we're putting it together. The library staff will keep you posted on the latest developments. HERE'S HOPING FOR SUNNY SKIES.
