# The Great Chicago Fire: Rising From the Ashes

The Great Chicago Fire burned through the city October 8-10, 1871, killing 300 people and leaving more than 100,000 residents homeless. As raindrops finally doused the flames and city leaders assessed the damage, the shock of the tragedy was replaced by the resolve to rebuild. The *Chicago Tribune* echoed the sentiment of most when it proclaimed in its first post-fire issue: "CHICAGO SHALL RISE AGAIN."

In this program we will look at the causes of the fire and how Chicago re-invented itself in the aftermath. In the period from 1872 through the *Plan of Chicago* in 1909, the city would rebuild, only to do it all again in the early 20th Century. After the Great Fire, the city would rise from the ashes, only to fall to the progress of time.




