Catalog Migration Upcoming Changes to Lowell Services and Items

Lowell Public Library is excited to announce that we will be changing our catalog system to Evergreen Indiana. This will allow our patrons (you) a wider range of items to browse, use and enjoy. After our new system move is complete, our patrons (you) will have access to over 8 million items that we share with over 200 libraries. The new Evergreen Indiana card can be used at any of the Evergreen Libraries in the state of Indiana.

Lowell Public Library is an independent library district that has shared Lake County Public Library's (LCPL) online catalog service for many years. We are grateful for the partnership. The needs of our patrons have evolved, so we are making changes to serve our community more fully. Changing to the new system and separating Lowell's and LCPL's catalogs will take several months. You may experience some temporary disruption as items make their way back home.

Frequently Asked Questions

- 1. What if I have a LCPL item checked out right now?

 After August 1, items will not automatically renew. When the item is due, please return it as usual to a Lowell or LCPL location to avoid late fees.
- 2. I can see in the catalog that LCPL has a copy of the item I want. Why can't I place a hold?

 LCPL items will continue to appear in the Lowell catalog during this

LCPL items will continue to appear in the Lowell catalog during this transition, but we will no longer be requesting materials the way we used to. Once Lowell's migration is complete, LCPL items will no longer appear in our catalog. We will have a new catalog with over 8 million items to choose from.

- 3. What if the item I want is only at LCPL or a LCPL branch library? All libraries in Lake County have reciprocal agreements that allow for borrowing between libraries. Bring your Lowell library card in good standing to LCPL and they'll get you set up to borrow LCPL materials. Remember, items need to be returned to the library they are checked out
- 4. I can't get to LCPL. I relied on LCPL sending items to Lowell!

 During this transition, we are using other services to obtain items you request. This service is available to Lowell cardholders and allows us to borrow books from other libraries across the country on your behalf. During the transition we can still get the items you need, delivered here to Lowell Public Library.
- 5. How long is this whole transition going to take?
 We anticipate the migration being complete by mid-December.


Adult Coloring



Summer Reading Successes!

At the end of the eight week Summer Reading Club *Mooove Into Summer Reading* program, the numbers were tallied and showed that 571 children at the Lowell library and the Shelby and Schneider branches were registered in the program. They read 23,552 books and 27,552 chapters! Tessa Hoover's name was announced during our reptile show – she is the winner of our Summer Reading barn!

The Young Adults had a great summer! There were 131 readers. Marta VanderMeulen, an avid reader, won a \$100 gift card. Five young adults entered the art contest. Ava Pocius won a \$20.00 gift card for her art and Willow Scheidt won a \$20 gift card for her writing titled "The Boy That Meets the Turtle".

Our Adult patrons had a summer reading contest too. 72 participants reported over 2160 hours of reading! The winner of our Spring Run Farm gift card drawing was Susan Lopez!
